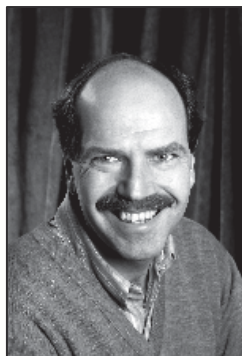

Dr. Zbigniew Brzezinski

Former National Security Advisor

From 1977 to 1981 Dr. Brzezinski was national security advisor to the president of the United States. In 1981, he was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom “for his role in the normalization of U.S.-Chinese relations and for his contributions to the human rights and national security policies of the United States.”

Before his government service, Dr. Brzezinski was on the faculty of Harvard University (1953-60) and Columbia University (1960-69). He received his bachelor’s and master’s degrees from McGill and his doctorate from Harvard.

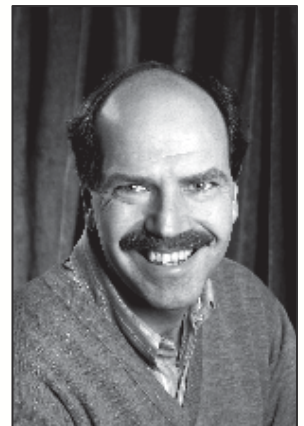
Dr. Brzezinski is a frequent public speaker, commentator on major domestic and foreign TV programs, and contributor to domestic and foreign newspapers and journals. He is a prolific author. His most recent book is *America and the World: Conversations on the Future of American Foreign Policy*, coauthored with Brent Scowcroft and moderated by David Ignatius. He is also the author of *Second Chance: Three Presidents and the Crisis of American Superpower*; *The Choice: Global Domination or Global Leadership*; *The Grand Chessboard: American Primacy and its Geostrategic Imperatives*; the best-selling *The Grand Failure: The Birth and Death of Communism in the 20th Century*; *Out of Control: Global Turmoil on the Eve of the 21st Century*; *Game Plan: How to Conduct the U.S.-Soviet Contest*; *Power and Principle: Memoirs of the National Security Adviser, 1977-1981*; *The Fragile Blossom: Crisis and Change in Japan*; *Between Two Ages: America’s Role in the Technetronic Era*; *The Soviet Bloc: Unity and Conflict*; and other books and many articles in numerous U.S. and foreign academic journals.

Andrew Kipnis is a senior fellow in the Departments of Anthropology and Political and Social Change at the Australian National University. His research interests focus on cultural, social and political change in China. He is author of *Governing Educational Desire: Culture, Politics and Schooling in China* (U. of Chicago Press, 2011), *China and Postsocialist Anthropology: Theorizing Power and Society after Communism* (Eastbridge, 2008), and *Producing Guanxi: Sentiment, Self and Subculture in a North China Village* (Duke U. Press, 1997). He is also co-editor of *The China Journal*.



Professor Kipnis received his doctorate from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.



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
