2008

July

George Gilboy quoted in the article “Stirrings in the Suburbs” in the *Financial Times*

September

Huang Yanzhong quoted in several publications about the milk powder scandal in China, including *Christian Science Monitor* and *The National*

George Gilboy meets with National Committee organized delegation of U.S. mayors focusing on sustainability in China

October

Huang Yanzhong moderates a panel on China's healthcare reform, and presents on "China's New Health Diplomacy," at a meeting at the Center for Strategic and International Studies

Huang Yanzhong quoted in a *Xingdao Ribao* article (in Chinese) about the tainted milk powder scandal and interviewed for the *Gray Sheet* about health care reform in China

January

Tobie is helping to develop China-related curriculum for a third and fourth grade social studies program in an elementary school in her community. She also helped the school secure a student teacher from George Mason University who will teach first and second grade students introductory Chinese language in exchange for course credit.

Tobie Meyer-Fong gives lecture at orientation for the National Committee's Student Leaders' Exchange

Alex Wang and his colleagues work with Ma Jun, one of China's top environmentalists, on an evaluation of municipal government pollution information disclosure, which received good attention from Chinese domestic press
