#### THURSDAY, JULY 13

8:00 a.m. Traditions and Transitions: A Walk and Discussion in Beijing's Historic Hutongs

Mr. Jeremiah Jenne, Executive Director, the Hutong

Hútongs are the narrow streets and alleys that run through Ming- and Qing-era sìhéyuàn (traditional courtyard residences) neighborhoods. The word hutong first appeared during the Yuan Dynasty (1271-1368), and is a term of Mongolian origin meaning "water well."

One of Beijing's most distinctive urban features, the hutongs have long been at the heart of the capital's distinctive local culture. Our walk will explore the past, present, and future of the hutongs. It will take us through the Dongcheng District, once home to some of Beijing's most fascinating figures.

Today these neighborhoods also represent Beijing's vibrant future, as old spaces are repurposed into new commercial and residential developments. We will discuss the history of the hutongs, who lived there and why. As we stroll, we will also visit local markets and sample some of Beijing's famous street snacks. Finally, we will examine how the pressures of rapid urban development are presenting challenges to the preservation of the physical structures and communities of these neighborhoods.

Jeremiah Jenne is a writer and historian based in Beijing since 2002. He taught Chinese history and philosophy for nearly 10 years. He has written extensively on China for a number of publications including *The Economist, The Atlantic Monthly, Journal of Asian Studies, Asia Society, Los Angeles Review of Books, The Beijinger, and the World of Chinese*. His work can be found in the anthologies *China in 2008: A Year of Great Significance, The Insider's Guide to Beijing,* and the 2015 collection *While We're Here: China Stories from a Writer's Colony.* He is a recurring guest on the public affairs podcast *Sinica* and is frequently asked to speak on Chinese culture and history to

#### Morning Forbidden City

The Forbidden City, formally known as Gùgōng (故宫) or the Palace Museum was given its name because commoners were barred from entering the grounds. With a total area of 183 acres, it is the largest palace complex in the world. During the Ming and Qing dynasties (1368-1911), 24 emperors ruled China from within the Forbidden City.

#### **Ministry of Education**

#### Dr. Yang Yinfu, Deputy Director-General

The Ministry of Education regulates all aspects of the educational system in mainland China, the equivalent to the U.S. Department of Education. It certifies educators, standardizes curricula and textbooks, establishes standards, and monitors the entire education system.

#### **Ministry of Foreign Affairs**

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs is the government office responsible for China's diplomatic relationships with other countries, analogous to the U.S. State Department.

#### **Tiananmen Square**

Tiān'ānmén Square (天安门, "Gate of Heavenly Peace") is the largest open urban square in the world, and the geographical and spiritual center of Beijing. An important historical site for hundreds of years, today it is surrounded by various government buildings, including the Great Hall of the People and the National Museum of China. Near the south end sits Mao's Mausoleum, where China's former leader lies in state in a crystal coffin.

Caochangdi is an urban village and renowned arts district. Translated as "grasslands" in Mandarin, it is home to a diverse group of residents, including migrant workers, farmers, students and artists, most notably, Ai Weiwei. Caochangdi developed into a thriving arts and cultural hub when artists began to move into the area around 2000, attracting international attention similar to the nearby 798 Art Zone.

#### **Jiaxiu Pavilion and Yangming Temple**

Jiaxiu Pavilion is located on a giant stone in the Nanming River. It was first built in Ming Dynasty, and was reconstructed many times, most recently in in 1909. Visitors can view stone engravings, calligraphy works, paintings and woodworks by ancient artists, including 206 character-long antithetical couplet written by Liu Yushan, Qing Dynasty-era member of the Guiyang Imperial Academy.

Wang Yangming was a Chinese idealist Neo-Confucian philosopher, official, educationist, calligraphist and general during the Ming dynasty. He developed the idea of innate knowing, arguing that every person knows from birth the difference between good and evil, and is regarded as one of the four great masters of Confucianism, along with Confucius, Mencius and Zhu Xi.

#### **Blue Flower Project**

The Blue Flower Project is an NGO located at Guizhou Normal University that works with rural women from the Miao ethnic group to preserve traditional patterns and dying techniques and bring these high quality products to market. The Miáo people are one of the 56 official minority groups recognized by the Chinese government. Sixty percent of the Miao live in Guizhou, forming the largest ethnic group in the country.

#### Visit Sanxingdui Site and Museum

Sanxingdui ("three stars mound") is archeological site now believed to be the site of a major ancient Bronze Age city. The site was first discovered in 1929 and then rediscovered in 1986, when archaeologists excavated artifacts, that radiocarbon dating shows as being from the 12th-11th centuries BCE. The discovery at Sanxingdui challenges the traditional narrative of Chinese civilization having spread from the central plain of the Yellow River; instead, Chinese archaeologists have begun to speak of multiple centers of ancient Chinese civilization.

Miányáng is a prefecture-level city that contains Beichuan Qiang Autonomous County. Since the catastrophic 2008 earthquake, the area has fought hard to recover economically and culturally.

## Qiang Ethnic Minority Folklore Museum

The Qiāng are one of 56 ethnic groups officially recognized in the People's Republic of China. A matrilineal society, they live mainly in mountainous region in the northwestern part of Sichuan province, on the eastern edge of the Tibetan plateau. This state-of-the-art museum replaced the original Qiang facility that was destroyed in the 2008 earthquake.

#### **Chengdu Research Base of Giant Panda Breeding**

The Research Base of Giant Panda Breeding is a non-profit research and breeding facility for giant pandas and other rare animals. Started in 1987 with six pandas rescued from the wild, the base now has the largest panda population on earth with 113 captive pandas. The Research Base also helps with governmental diplomatic missions by sending pandas to overseas locations as good-will ambassadors. It has an ongoing partnership with the Smithsonian, the San Diego Zoo, and many other international organizations.

Afternoon Jinsha Site Museum Accidentally discovered in 2001 by workers doing road work and digging holes for new water pipe lines, the archaeological Jinsha site has already yielded thousands of gold, jade, bronze, stone and ivory artifacts – as well as human remains. Part of the Sanxingdui culture, the area flourished around 1000 B.C. when it was an important political center in the later phase of the ancient Shu kingdom.
